## Highlighting the Work of Hull No Place for Hate

As mentioned above, the Town of Hull's <u>No</u> <u>Place for Hate Committee</u> has been a great support to the Friends. Members of the Committee have helped keep our free Saturday performance series running for the past several seasons. Their mission is as follows: "Hull No Place for Hate is a non-partisan town committee dedicated to building bridges of understanding within our community. We seek to promote diversity, equity, and inclusion among all people."



Recently, the committee organized the annual "Take a Stand in the Sand" event on Nantasket Beach, a tradition since 2001. This powerful demonstration sees hundreds of participants come together to form messages such as "Hull is No Place for Hate" and "Hull for All," symbolizing the community's dedication to inclusivity. Another significant event was the Martin Luther King Jr. Day celebration, which included pancake breakfasts, educational programs, and support for community service initiatives like Wellspring's Food Drive in 2024. The committee also facilitated "Feasts of Conversations," small group discussions designed to bring residents together over shared meals to enhance understanding and appreciation of diversity within the town.

Looking ahead, the committee holds monthly meetings, either in person or via Zoom, which are open to the public and posted on the town's website and Facebook page. These meetings serve as a platform for planning future initiatives that continue to promote equity and inclusivity. While specific upcoming events have not yet been announced, the committee encourages community members to get involved by attending meetings and contributing to the development of future projects.
